Mouth (Oral) Biopsy under Local Anaesthetics

WHAT IS A BIOPSY?

A biopsy is a procedure where a small piece of tissue is removed from a specific area so that it can be looked at closely under a microscope.

There are two types of biopsy:

An excision biopsy – Where the biopsy aims to remove an area completely. This is usually only appropriate for small lumps or swellings.

An incision biopsy - Occasionally only a small piece of an abnormal area is removed to confirm a diagnosis.

HOW IS THIS DONE?

A local anaesthetic injection, which takes a couple of minutes to work, is used to numb the area. Following this injection the procedure should be painless. A biopsy usually leaves a small hole that often requires stitching. In the majority of cases the stitches used are dissolvable and take around two weeks to disappear.

In total, this procedure usually takes around 15 minutes from start to finish.

IS THERE ANY RISK INVOLVED?

There may be some soreness or some mild bleeding. Very occasionally there can be some numbness in the area where the tissue is taken which persists after the procedure.

IS THERE MUCH SORENESS AFTERWARDS?

When the anaesthetic wears off, there will be some pain and discomfort. Simple painkillers will usually be effective and you will be advised which are the best to take. Any discomfort usually only lasts a few days.

WILL THERE BE MUCH BLEEDING?

Although there may be a little bleeding at the time of the biopsy this usually stops very quickly and is unlikely to be a problem if the wound is stitched.

Should the biopsy site bleed again once you get home, apply pressure over the area, with a rolled up handkerchief or swab (if you have been given one), for at least 10 minutes. This should stop the bleeding but if it does continue please contact the department.

WHEN CAN I RETURN TO WORK?

This largely depends on your job and how you feel after the procedure. Most people are able to return to work later the same day.

WILL I NEED ANOTHER APPOINTMENT?

Since the stitches are dissolvable, a follow-up is not always necessary but you will usually be asked to attend an appointment for the results of the biopsy to be discussed with you. A care advice leaflet will be given to you after the biopsy.
